I received a note from Jerri and Margaret Stensberg on the 24th. They are doing well at this time, and Jerry will soon be having some eye surgery for cataracts. Their grandson, in the army, is serving in Egypt at this time, and is doing well. No more news from Mugs in the note, so things seem fine in the north. Good luck on the eye surgery, Jerry. 


I hope that I have not forgotten some of the correspondence for this issue. I have been so overwhelmed by this move that I have misplaced everything.

## Historical Biography in Progress about Betty Grable

All services. Published author and historian researching and writing a definitive historical study in progress about the late actress and WWII pin-up girl, Betty Grable, is seeking written remembrances, brief or long, for inclusion in two chapters about her life and times during the war.

Professor Sale would like to hear from veterans of WWII what Betty Grable herself, or her pin-up photo itself, meant to you. In addition, those veterans who have special first-hand memories of Grable's WWII films as well as of her USO performances are encouraged to add them to any written recollections provided. In doing so, it would be helpful if noted when and where her wartime films or USO shows were seen.

Betty Grable devoted countless hours as a wartime volunteer for U.S. Navy Aide. This is another important era of her life. Thus, veterans who served in the Navy during WWII and who met Grable when she worked on behalf of U.S. Navy Aide are encouraged to contribute their special written memories.

In addition, during the early years of the war, Grable volunteered her time for many evenings of service at the Hollywood Canteen. Those servicemen who may have danced with her or who came to personally know her when she was working at the Hollywood Canteen are encouraged as well to contribute their written remembrances on behalf of this biography.

Any and all written inclusions cited or referred to as sources in the published version of this historical biography about Betty Grable's times will receive formal permission requests provided to each contributor for their signed approval and release. This will follow a careful reading and study of all written remembrances that are sent to Professor Sale in the near future.


