Greetings, Helpmates,

Well, the day is almost at hand when we will meet in our annual reunion. BELLEFONTE — Lester Lenker of Bellefonte is one happy man.

Fifty-five years after the fact, the World War II veteran finally has his D-Day medal.

The Liberation of France Invasion Medal arrived recently at Lenker's Zion Road home, sent courtesy of U.S. Sen. Rick Santorum.

On Saturday, the retired West Penn lineman said he has both Santorum and Centre County Veterans' Affairs director Stan Adams to thank for getting the medal to him.

"My outfit didn't go in right on D-Day, so I didn't know I was even entitled to it until recently," said Lenker, now 74. "But I'm really glad to have it."

Lenker, then a 19-year-old Army private, and his outfit, the 284th Field Artillery, landed on Utah Beach Aug. 16, 1944 — more than two months after the initial June 6th invasion. But once there, they spent 260 days in continuous combat, battling their way to the German/Austrian border.

"The 284th gave infantry support," said Lenker, who remains in touch with his old unit by attending reunions. "According to the records, we shot 98,500 rounds at the enemy."

To Lenker's knowledge, he is the 284th's last remaining Centre County member.

"Tom Dubbs of Bush Hollow and James F. Kessinger of State College were both in my outfit, but they've both passed away," Lenker said. "I don't know of any others."

That's it for this trip. See some of you at the reunion. Stay healthy, and take care of those health problems.

It wasn't so long ago that highway 76 was the best route to get from one end of Branson to the other. Sometimes that meant "smooth sailing," and sometimes that meant "traffic jam." Today, however, a web of new roads are in place (and more to come) to help keep a steady flow. Yes, you can still find a traffic jam from time to time, but these new and expanded roads help you get to your destination much faster—and they really work.

One thing we suggest you do before you leave home is turn to look at our map. Roads are marked and theaters are noted. A little familiarity with the location of your destinations, i.e. your hotel and the shows you plan to see, could save you hours during your stay.

Now, let's go ahead and take a look at the general traffic picture. We'll clue you in to the Time-Saver Routes and pass on Time Saver Tips.

Even with the addition of alternate routes, Branson's main drag, highway 76 (a.k.a. Country Music Boulevard, the Musical Mile and the Strip), is still the area's most heavily traveled stretch of highway. It can accommodate about 29,000 cars a day.

The reason the Strip is so popular is because it's the 5-mile section of road running east and west where the entertainment began. And it's still "where to go" to see loads of entertainment, restaurants, hotels, attractions, shops and shopping centers.

This famous section of road is definitely an "attraction" you'll want to include in your plans; however, you need to pick the time for this adventure and learn what you can do when "cruising the Strip" turns into "crawling the Strip." The answer? You guessed it, alternate routes and access roads.

Time-Saver Routes

These routes bypass highway 76 on the north and south and are marked on our map. The color-coded routes are called the **Blue Route**, **Yellow Route**, and **Red Route**. You'll see signs on the side of the road that correspond to these colors. In addition to the signs, new Blue, Yellow, and Red color blocks are painted directly on the road to help you as you go.

The Blue Route is still the one our staff uses most often. This route consists of Roark Valley Road going west, running mostly parallel to the Strip on the north side. Roark Valley becomes Gretna Road and finally intersects with the Strip again at highway 165. The key is to know the location of your final destination and use one of the many connecting roads leading back to highway 76.

You can use the Yellow Route and the Red Route the same as the Blue Route. The Yellow Route bypasses the Strip on the south side, and the Red Route bypasses it on the upper north. We use these often, too; it just depends on where we're going. These roads are where you'll find new outlet mails, theaters, hotels and restaurants.

New Time-Saver Tips

At the point where **Gretna Road** and **Roark Valley Road** intersect (part of the **Blue Route**), you can now continue on Gretna Road to the northeast and connect with **highway** 248 (the **Red Route**).

The new five-iane section of **Shepherd of the Hills** Expressway is complete. It runs east from highway 76 (at the Country Tonite Theatre) for 5 1/2 miles to the junction of highways 65 & 248 (the **Red Route**).

And Green Mountain Dr. (the Yellow Route) now connects highways 165 and 376, providing another east-west

thoroughfare. It's a three-lane road with access to the back parking lots of several theaters. This route helps you avoid the most crowded, slow-going part of highway 76.

The bottom line: New and improved alternate routes and access roads are your alternatives to "crawling the Strip." Keep one eye on the road, one eye on the map (pages 32-33), and use the Blue, Yellow, and Red Routes to maneuver around the city.

Driving into Branson

One of the most common ways to enter town is to come in on highway 65 and take highway 76 west. If you hit the 30-minute-to-an-hour timeframe before shows begin or after they end (in the afternoon most shows begin at 2 or 3 and last about 2 hours; in the evening most begin at 7 or 8, again about 2 hours), you might get tied up in the traffic. You can use this time to go sightseeing on the

Strip, or you can try one of these suggestions:

We, unofficially, call these our "back door" routes. We like them a lot for three reasons. One, you see much more of the beautiful Ozarks scenery. Two, these routes give you the "big picture" of the whole area by getting you to try new roads. And three, you can save time by avoiding the congestion of highway 76 (similar to using the "official" Blue, Yellow, and Red Routes).

door" suggestion is to continue past highway 76 to the south and take highway 165 west. You'll end up on the western end of the Strip, and along the way you'll have avoided some traffic, taken in a great view of the Ozarks, and passed by Table Rock Dam and Visitors Center, the Shepherd of the Hills Fish Hatchery, and the new Branson USA Amusement Park (go ahead and stop in, if you have the time).

Our second "back door" suggestion is to drive into Branson via highway 13 on the far western end of town, Branson West, and turn onto highway 76 going east. This route will take you on some curves and hills, by Silver Dollar City, Indian Point, Shepherd of the Hills and finally straight into town on the Strip. Tip: Going straight into town is often congested. Look for the traffic congestion light on the side of the road just before reaching highway 265. If it's flashing, you may want to exit onto highway 265 and take it, a more scenic route, back to a point on highway 76.

The bottom line: Take the 65-165-76 route or the 13-76-265-76 route for a relaxing drive around the Ozarks. The change in scenery is a delight.

Flying into Branson

The only way to fly directly into Branson is to arrive by charter or private craft and land at the M. Graham Clark Airport. It's located one mile south of town on highway 65 at the College of the Ozarks. Call 888-458-9696 for information on the airport and car or cab services.

For commercial flights, your closest option is the Springfield-Branson Regional Airport (417-869-0300) located 43 miles north of Branson in Springfield. With over 70 daily arrivals and departures, non-stop service is available by TWA and TWE to St. Louis, USAirways Express to Kansas City, American Eagle to Dallas, Northwest Airlink to Memphis, and United Express to both Chicago and Denver. The airport is also served by 8 car rental agencies as well as a variety of taxi, limousine and shuttle services.

Big Sky Airlines (800-237-7788) has flights from St. Louis and Dallas/Ft. Worth into the **Boone County Airport** in Harrison, Arkansas (501-741-6954). About a 45-minute ride to Branson, the airport has taxi, courtesy car, and rental cars available.

When to go to Branson

There are five "seasons" of entertainment in Branson. Hot Winter Fun covers January through March. Each year more and more shows, restaurants, hotels and attractions stay open during the winter months. It's the town's newest season, designed to make Branson a year-round vacation destination. Branson Country Spring is March through May. It's a great time for outdoor-lovers. Branson Summer Holiday, Memorial Day through Labor Day, is the perfect time for fun in the water. The Autumn Celebration in September and October is popular for the seasonal feel and fall forest coloration. And finally, Ozark Mountain Christmas in November and December is favored by many for sparkling Christmas shows and the millions of lights and holiday decorations around the town.

Pick your favorite season (or two) and come see us!

What to take

Dress for the season—our weather is typical of the Midwest. It's also a good idea to check the regional weather map a few days before your visit.

The dress code is casual—everywhere. You're welcome in every show, restaurant and business wearing casual, comfortable clothing. You can dress up if you like, but it's not pressary.

Here are some necessary items we can think of: comfortable walking shoes, a jacket or sweater in case of cool evenings, and an umbrella in case of a surprise shower. We're famous for quick weather changes, so be prepared for anything. Also, if you forget something, clothing of all kinds is available in Branson.

What else should you take? We suggest you take your camera, lots of film and binoculars. Most shows allow you to take photos during performances, and many stars will pose with you at intermission or after the show. Binoculars may not be necessary, but could afford a close-up view in case you don't get the coveted front row seat.

We also suggest you take this magazine with you. You'll find it helpful because you'll always have a map with you. You'll also be able to plan what shows you're going to see, what you're going to do between shows, approximately how much money you'll need, where to stay, and much more.

Now—pack your bags and get yourself to Branson.

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
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
