Greetings, all,

As you may have noticed on the date of the last bulletin, I had not expected to mail it out until mid-August, but wanted to get the word out on the reunion dates as early as possible. It seemed unusual for one of our meetings to begin on Monday, but I thought nothing more of it, then I found out that the early arrivers would get there on Monday, and the rest on the next day. I am hoping that none of the group were harmed by this glitch, but it was an honest misjudgment. Hopefully we will recover without too much damage.

On the evening of the 24th I got a phone call from Minnie DeMonaco with the dreadful news that Al had died earlier in July (8th), from an odd infection which produced a gangrenous result, and caused his death. He had been feeling badly, Minnie said, and just before he was put in the hospital, he asked that a daughter be called to see him. She was a nurse, and immediately took him to the hospital, where he was admitted. Tests were done, but no certain diagnosis was determined, and he became more ill, and died. Al was a great guy, and he flawlessly drove the medical jeep all through the war. He was very well liked, and had a great reputation as an aid man. He took our jeep on every one of our aid calls we had, and was driving when we had the mortar fire so heavily at Hamm.

I have already sent Minnie the regrets and condolences of our group, and I hope she and the family can weather the severe loss they have endured. Al will be missed. He and Minnie had planned being in New Orleans, as they have relatives in that area whom they would have liked to visit. I made a special invitation to Minnie to join us, as she can visit relatives, and still enjoy the reunion festivities. She is going to consider it, and I hope we see her there. She is now on our roster as Al's representative.

Our cool weather here in St. Louis is history. We had delightful 80+ temperature for the last 3 or 4 days, but it has gone back up to the mid 90's. The jet stream does odd things to our weather patterns.

I received a note from Irv Merrill with the obit notice which he received concerning Harry Hudson, one of our wartime officers. I am going to put this item in the newsletter at a later time. Harry was in the printing business, and I had a letter from him several years ago, but had no other contact to my knowledge. Thanks for the notice, Irv. I get few timely notifications from survivors, it seems.

And speaking of survivors, I received a call from Ann Forester, Gen. Sanders' daughter. She tells me that her mother died of age related infirmities, and that the General is doing fairly well at this time. He gets the usual things which we all recognize in ourselves, but lives with a little help arranged by Mrs. Forester. Ann believes that I must have heard from a grandson who lives in Minnesota, not in Florida, as I thought.

The General has poor hearing, possibly related to his artillery background, and does very poorly with telephone communications. He has help with his usual chores, along with the weekend visits which Ann makes to Lawton.

Ann enjoys the newsletter, and recalls many conversations with her dad about the goings on in the group. She would like to get our bulletin, which has been arranged here at the Message Center.

Thank you for the information, Ann. Join us in our activities if you are able. Several second generations members of Helpmate exist, and I would recommend that you keep up with our activities by logging onto our battalion's web-

site.
